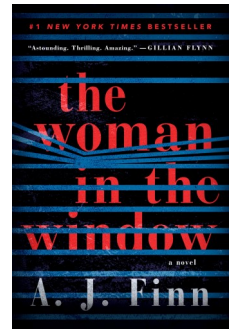

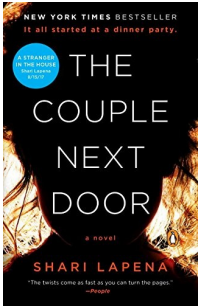
The Woman in the Window by A.J. Finn

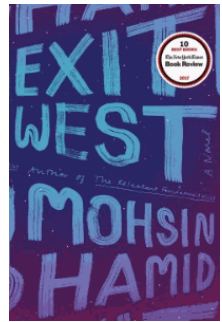
The Couple Next Door by Shari Lapena

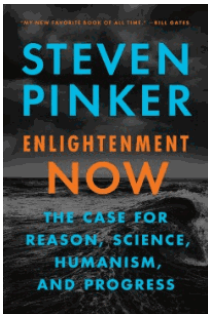
Exit West by Mohsin Hamid

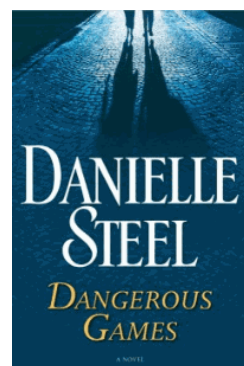
Enlightenment now : the case for reason, science, humanism, and progress by Steven Pinker

Explores how to confront social problems and continue progress through the application of Enlightenment era ideals, including reason, science, and humanism.



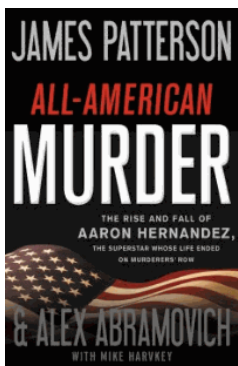
Dangerous Games by Danielle Steel

The Keeper of Lost Things by Ruth Hogan



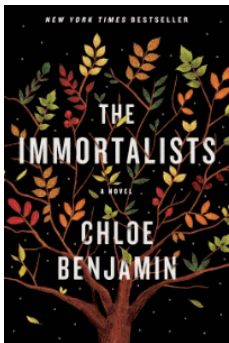

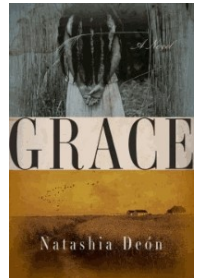

The Immortalists by Chloe Benjamin



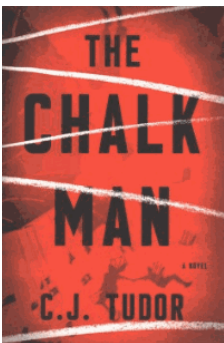
